Students were taught the correct terminology for precision cutting such as Brunoise, Mirepoix, Paysanne to name a few. Armed with this knowledge all Year 11 Hospitality students successfully completed and were marked competent on their assessment task. Photographic evidence during and on completion is a VET requirement. Students showed an extremely high/advanced standard of

## Year 7 -Renaissance Reading Program

At the start of 2020 students in Year 7 were enrolled in the Renaissance Reading program, whereby students are to borrow books within their reading range (based on a diagnostic assessment taken once a term) and read for at least 20 minutes in their classes across the day. Once a student finishes their book, they then take a comprehension quiz to check for their understanding and continue this pattern until their next diagnostic assessment. Even with all of the disruptions of 2020 during the first half of the year, students in each Year 7 class have improved their reading and comprehension skills in the program. The following chart indicates the percentages of students in each Year 7 class that have not only met their expected growth during Semester 1, but have also exceeded their targets:



This term Year 7 students have been working towards meeting their individualised reading targets. In order to gain points to meet their targets, students need to borrow and read books from the library and get 80% or above in their comprehension quiz. All students who meet their individualised reading target by the end of Term 3 will be rewarded with a pizza party in the Library.

Well done to all Year 7 students, teachers and Ms King our incredible Librarian. Keep reading Year 7!

### **External Validation**

Every 4 years each school undergoes a process called External Validation where other principals come to your school (virtually this year) and discuss with you and your team why you have made the judgements you have about your school in 14 different areas. The report that must be completed two weeks prior to this discussion requires much work to pull together the evidence from across the school to validate the judgement. The Director Educational Leadership (the Principal's boss) also was a part of the discussion. Here is what she sent to Mrs Harding after the panel discussion.

#### Dear Janet,

Congratulations on the wonderful External Validation panel meeting yesterday. It was clearly evident that there is a school wide culture that supports individual student wellbeing and learning needs. I was particularly impressed (as was the panel) with the classroom profiles, learning hub and the work across all faculties on literacy and numeracy. The work of Mr. Karbon and the team with the Berry Street Education Model is extraordinary and is clearly driving the positive culture evident in the school. Improved academic results and reductions in behaviour incidents appears to be driven by relational trust between students and staff. I would love to know more! The value added results, expected growth and the results of the TTFM survey, show that the efforts across the school are paying great dividends. It is clear that the vision and culture of Doonside are owned by students and staff alike. Distributed leadership was so apparent and all students and staff representing Doonside High School yesterday spoke with passion and pride. There was so much to celebrate, I enjoyed every minute of the panel. I acknowledge this was a team effort, please pass on my congratulations to all involved.
